

If you are angry against your neighbor, you are angry against God; and if you bear anger in your heart, your pride is lifted up against the Lord. If you rebuke in envy, all your reproof is wicked.

But if love dwells in you, you have no enemy on earth. And if you are a true child of peace, you will do no wrong to your neighbor.

And if you love to be angry, be angry with the wicked, and it will be appropriate. If you look to wage war, here is Satan for your adversary. If you wish to revile, display your curses against the demons.

But if you insult the King's image, you will pay the penalty of murder; and if you revile a human being, you revile the image of God. Do honor to your neighbor, and you have honored God. But if you wish to dishonor God, attack your neighbor in anger!

The Sunday of the Prodigal Son

The Parable of the Prodigal Son centers on each human being's deepest need for repentance in order to have and maintain a relationship with our Heavenly Father. It is dramatically lived out by the un-named younger son who consciously cuts off ties with his father and exiles himself into a distant alien land. And quickly he squandered all of his father's gifts on "prodigal" living, losing everything. Actually, he began to perish there coming close to dying from hunger because of severe fam-



claimed, "For this my son was dead and is alive again; he was lost and now is found," receiving true mercy, for mercy can only be received in sincere humble repentance.

This parable forms an exact icon of repentance at its different stages. Sin is exile, enslavement to strangers and hunger. Repentance, on the other hand, is the return from exile to our true home where we receive back our inheritance and freedom in the Father's house. But true repentance also requires action: "I will rise up and go ... " To repent is not just to feel dissatisfied, but to make a decision to improve and to act upon it. In the words of our Lord, we learn of three things in this parable: the condition of the sinner, the need of repentance, and the greatness of God's compassion. We see ourselves in the person of the Prodigal Son, because of our own sinful condition and pray that we may come to our senses and return to God through repentance. For those who may have fallen into great despair over their sins thinking that there is no forgiveness, this parable offers hope. The Heavenly Father patiently and lovingly waits for our return. There is no sin that can overcome His love for us. This parable also offers us insight into the world in which we live. It is a world where the activities of people are often disconnected and not ordered toward the fulfillment of God's divine purpose for our lives. This is a world of incoherent pursuits and illusory strivings, the craving for food and drink that do not satisfy, a world engulfed in untruth, deceit and sin where nothing ultimately makes sense. It is the exact opposite of the world as created by God and restored by his Son and Spirit. There is no cure for the evils of our age without return to God. Our world is not a normal world, but rather a wasteland.

This is why the reading of Psalm 137 is added to the Matins service today and on the two following Sundays of Meatfare and Cheesefare. This nostalgic lament of the Hebrew exiles states: "By the streams of Babylon we sat and wept as we remembered Zion. On the willows we hung our harps, for how could we sing the Lord's song in a strange land" (Psalm 137). Here we can see the challenge of life in this world and the alienation from God that happens when sin reigns in our lives. As a result of sin, we lose the joy of communion with God, defiling our spiritual beauty, finding ourselves far away from our real home, which is the real life—being one with God. True repentance helps us to realize this, and it deeply compels us to return; to recover what has been discarded. The Church reminds us of what we have abandoned and lost, and beckons us to find the desire and power to return. Our Heavenly Father is full of compassion for His children, patiently waiting to receive us with His loving forgiveness and saving embrace as depicted in today's icon.

We pray in the liturgy (page 29) "You do not turn your face from the sinner but offer repentance as a way for salvation." This God inspired line succinctly encompasses this whole parable which St. John Chrysostom has handed down to us.

Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan to be baptized by him. John tried to prevent him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and yet you are coming to me?" Jesus said to him in reply, "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." Then he allowed him. After Jesus was baptized, he came up from the water and behold, the heavens were opened [for him], and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove [and] coming upon him. And a voice came from the heavens, saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." (Matt. 3:13-17)

At the Baptism of Jesus, we hear the Father speak these words about Jesus, His Son, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

Our Baptism enables us to Share God's Love

His public ministry -- the work of the Kingdom, to which His Father called Him.

At our Baptism, the Father spoke these same words about us: "*This is my beloved son/daughter, with whom I am well pleased.*" and our Baptism calls each of us to do our part in the work of the Kingdom.

Every person is "*beloved*" of God and every person has a special purpose for their lives. Have you ever thought about your special purpose? Have you ever considered what it means to be a beloved child of God?

What *does* it mean to be a child of God? *and* If I am a beloved child of God due to my baptism, what about every other baptized person? How do I treat every other "beloved child of God" who comes into my life every day?

By virtue of our baptism, we are given the grace and the faith to go out and share our faith and our very selves with others. There are many ways to share ourselves and our faith, some of the best are without words. Some examples are:

Shoveling snow for neighbors who cannot do it for themselves.

Write a thank you note to your mailcarrier, trash collector, or local police or fire fighters. These are persons who do things to help us and an acknowledgement of their service could make their day.

When it snows, scrape the windshields of someone who may be older or have small children.

Read a story or play a game with a younger sibling or the child of a friend or neighbor to give mom a break or a chance to do something that needs to be done.

- Erase the board or straighten up the room for a teacher without being asked.
- Smile and say "hi" to people as you walk down the street.

Speak to someone who appears to be alone.

Say 'thank you' to a parent, teacher, your pastor for the kindnesses that they share with you everyday.

The kindess shown to a person can help them feel God's love and care in their lives. The ways in which we are able to show kindness to others are endless. Be creative.

If you are able to share your faith with another, take a risk. Talk about your faith. Our faith grows as we share it. Make this Year of Mercy a special one in your family, in school, at work, wherever you go.

Our acts of kindness will help change our world into a better place. And our acts of kindness remind us and those around us that we are all "beloved children of God."

Christmas Trivia

Jan. 15, 1870 - The Donkey was first used as symbol of Democratic Party, in Harper's Weekly, drawn by Thomas Nast.

Jan. 18, 1778 - James Cook 'discovered' Hawaii, naming it 'The Sandwich Islands'.

Jan. 19, 1937 - Howard Hughes set a record by flying from Los Angeles to New York City in 7 hours, 28 minutes, 25 seconds.



The Icon of the Theophany of Our Lord

On the Feast of the Theophany, we commemmorate the revelation of God in the Most Holy Trinity for the first time. In fact, in Greek, the word "theophany" means "revelation". In the Gospel read on this day, Matthew 3:13-17, we hear the description of the Blessed Trinity, manifested at Christ's Baptism in the Jordan River.

As we look at the icon of the Feast, we see the following elements:



⇒John the Baptist knows that Jesus does not need to be baptized, but, both John and Jesus submit to the Law and Jesus is goes into the waters of the Jordan. Jesus is not submerged in the water, for creation was baptized in Him, not He by the water.

♦ The Holy Spirit is descending upon Jesus as a dove. The Father's words, proclaiming that Jesus is His beloved Son, are shown coming down from the partial circle at the top of the icon.
♦ The angels on the right side are waiting to attend and dress him after the baptism is over.
♦ There is an axe near John the Baptist, which reflects his warning that our lives must bear the fruit of the Spirit or else we will be removed. We cannot get comfortable or spiritually lazy.

Tropar of Theophany:

At Your baptism in the Jordan, O Lord, worship of the Trinity was revealed, for the Father's voice bore witness to You, calling You His beloved Son, and the Spirit in the form of a dove confirmed the truth of these words. O Christ God, Who appeared and enlightend the world, glory be to You!
